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"Rethinking the Geopolitics of Higher Education"





- Investigate the impact of geopolitics on international academic relations;
- Explore the complexities and limitations of university manifestations of transnational solidarity in the times of war and terror;
- Elaborate on geopolitical forces affecting knowledge production within the context of super-complex cultural and political legacies affecting societies and universities in crises.

PREMISES

- "it is important to distinguish between solidarity and compassion and to be aware that humanitarianism is less an analytical category than a context-dependent, social and political argument of historical actors" (Lohr, 2014:235)
- "Building solidarity demands laborious reflection on the vicissitudes of intimacy and indifference that move or immobilize us as political subjects." (Korkman, 2022:162)
- "a starting point is to admit transnational solidarity demands labor from allies" (Korkman, 2022:169)
- "..solidary actions are often related to struggles for a collective goal, affective mobilization and the creation of a shared value-horizon (Bayertz, 1998a; Della Porta, 2018; Honneth, 1992, p. 208; Lynch & Kalaitzake, 2020)" (Kneuer et al. 2022: 370)
- "As Michael Geyer has put it, «knowledge regimes» do not have «the same effect» everywhere but create various spatial regimes of science and knowledge" (Lohr, 2014:244-245)

PREMISES

"The appeal to human solidarity, as well as to the related moral idea of common interests of humanity, is meant to bridge the gap between universal and particular moral appeals. Solidarity involves the linking of individuals by a common bond of fellow feeling and reciprocity of attitude. If one feels connected to another through common interests, then one also will tend to support the other similarly to how one would want oneself supported. In particular, there will be a close association between self-defense and defense of the other with whom one is bound in solidarity."

• Case of Ukraine: Higher Education and War

- Russia's annexation of Crimea and invasion of Eastern Ukraine 2014
- Full-scale invasion of Ukraine by the Russian Armed Forces on 22 February 2022
- Genocidal war (Russian president and governmental officials denying Ukrainian existence, identity, agency) past two years
- Acts of transnational solidarity against the aggressor-state

• Focus: Solidarity Under Scrutiny

- How do universities express transnational solidarity to their counterparts in war zones?
- Does geopolitics play a role in how universities reach out and help others?

"...in international criminal law, at least since the time of the Nuremberg trials, only waging aggressive war is seen as unjustified waging of war. What makes a war aggressive is an unprovoked attack by one State against another."

(May, 2007:185-186)





Methods

- Review and analysis of textual and graphic manifestations of transnational solidarity on flagship university websites in Poland, Czechia, Kazakhstan, China, and Japan;
- Thematic analysis and classification of transnational solidarity manifestations;
- Juxtaposition and comparison of manifestations on a proxy scale measuring different levels of support and solidarity: i.e., HIGH; MEDIUM; LOW; NIL.

Limitations

- Flagship universities do they represent the whole system?
- How much does the institutional manifestation account for individual manifestations in the same university or system? To what extent are the corporate manifestations reflective of academic ones?
- Not all acts of transnational solidarity are expressed through websites. Yet, the institutional websites are significant discursive interfaces and symbolic representations in that regard.



Academic dissent emerges on war in Ukraine but is censored

As China steers an ambiguous path on Ukraine – refusing to condemn Russian aggression yet supporting Ukraine's right to exist – Chinese academic dissent is emerging against the official government line, albeit quickly censored.

At the same time academics in China are scrambling to understand the fast-changing international landscape, with restrictions on international academic contacts still in place.

> The letter, signed by Nanjing University's Sun Jiang, Peking University's Wang Lixin, Hong Kong University's Xu Guoqi, Tsinghua University's Zhong Weimin, and Fudan University's Chen Yan, described the Russian invasion as a "war that began in the dark", and for an immediate end to the fighting.

"We emphatically call on the Russian government and President [Vladimir] Putin to stop the war and resolve any dispute through negotiations," it said, despite Beijing's ban on airing views on Russia in Ukraine, outlined in instructions from the government in late February.

- The university is a geopolitical place (see more in O'Brien, 2022);
- Its relations and narratives are part of a conceptual (as much as physical) geography of economic dependencies, cultural legacies, and security concerns (previously discussed by Chankseliani 2018; Oleksiyenko, Shchepetylnykova and Furiv, 2023);
- Variances in degrees of institutional manifestations of solidarity and support in times of crises (Oleksiyenko, 2023);
- **Discursive solidarity in institutional media** can be a useful source for understanding geopolitics in global higher education; yet, the institutional manifestations do not represent a full spectrum of solidarity discourse;
- For globally-engaged universities, **openly manifesting university positions** to local and international stakeholders becomes important in the post-neoliberal times.

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
