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- **Immobility:** The combination of physical immobility/disconnection and virtual mobility/connectivity is redefining international partnership and events:
 - Shifted emphasis on cross-border flows of data, information, knowledge
 - o Increased inclusivity, access, cost-efficiency, environmental-friendliness
 - Concerns over equality (such as for previously marginalised groups), digital security and privacy.
- **Inequality:** We are **[not]** all in this together. Academics are weathering the same storm, but under different shelters.
- Exacerbated inequality and disproportionate impacts: depending on factors like gender, race, ethnicity, faith, social class, health condition, caregiving responsibility, discipline, institution, career stage, administrative or teaching role, country/place of birth, and country/place of residence.









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- The pandemic did not create the **inequality**, but only intensified it.
- Underlying the tip of the iceberg, is **pre-existing and institutionalised injustice in global research**, with imprints of managerialism, performativity, discrimination, othering, marketisation, and the politicisation of research.



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- **Research Ethics:** Questions on the rigor, integrity, quality, impact, risk, and value of conducting research with adjusted methods in a crisis, for research communities, participants, funders, and the society.
- Ethics and Impacts: The emphasis on 'urgency' could marginalise some non-COVID-related research (particularly in the humanities and social sciences), while research fields with potentials for immediate impacts become predominant, better-acknowledged, and well-funded.
- **Research Impacts:** To what the extent has research generated **positive societal impacts**, been **used and communicated responsibly** (without misinterpretation or misuse), and been **trusted**? Answers vary across governments, media channels, and communities.







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Time to redefine future global research

- Changes can be present and temporary, but the decisions to keep them or not will be transformative for our future.
- What will the 'new norms' be for global research community?
- Will things changed now be forever transformed, or existed only as a 'COVID-limited edition'?
- How can research be understood beyond a zero-sum game, but as a global common good?
- How can we build a global research community that is open, equal, ethical, robust, sustainable, humanistic, diversified but collaborative, responsible and trustworthy?





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Time to redefine future global research

• Addressing those questions will require a long-term vision, structural changes, and collective commitment from all.
