Indian students in Germany

Year Number of Indian students

2008-09 3,516

2018-19 20,810

- Close to 500% increase
- Second most important source of foreign postgraduate students, after China
- Largest source of foreign students who study Engineering and Information Technology at the postgraduate level

Context

- Scholarship on student migration: the role of online media and social media in facilitating student mobility has received only passing mention.
- Scholarship on social media and mobility: focus mainly on role of social media in maintaining transnational networks, and promoting integration in destination country.
- Limited research on how online and social media can craft mobility. Existing studies argue:
 - Social media can help expand aspirant migrants' networks beyond "strong ties", re-establish contact with "weak ties" and activate "latent ties" (Granovetter 1973)
 - Impact of "latent ties" in the facilitation of migration → portrayed as limited.
 - Therefore, social media not seen as increasing social capital in significant way.


Fieldwork

- Fieldwork conducted between 2017 and 2018, 2020
- Online ethnographic fieldwork within 4
 Facebook groups and 15 WhatsApp groups research with aspirant student migrants
- Interviews with Indian students in Germany
 - 40 Indian students
 - 17 German universities
 - Vast majority (n=36) were studying for a Master's in Engineering (Mechanical, Civil, Chemical, Electrical, and Computer Science)
 - Vast majority (n=34) were male



- Process of organising to go abroad for study → complicated and stressful
- Existing social networks → not adequate
- Education consultants -> unreliable and uninformed
- Migration infrastructure on social media








Communities of Practice

(Wenger 2015)







shared domain of interest

members who interact, share information, help each other, and learn together a shared repertoire of resources such as experiences, stories, and tools and techniques of solving common problems

Information

- Available on internet but more easily accessible through groups
- Not easily available previously
- Not available previously:
 - Trends
 - Personal experience

- Close-knit community of collaborators
- Group members used words like "community", "family", "bro", "sis", "bhai", "anna", "akka" to refer to themselves/each other.
- Ethic of encouragement and support

Desire to "give back to the group" or "return the favour"



- Study abroad expertise = tremendous exchange value in the group
- Study abroad gurus

"In Football we have Lionel Messi as goat [Greatest Of All Time], in cricket we had Sachin Tendulkar as goat, in Germany education we have Karan sir as goat"

Vishnu: @Avinash I donno [if] god is there or not ... but he [Avinash] is there to help us.

Avinash: Anytime Bro. to help you guys.

Friendships beyond the groups

"He is very close to me. He regularly talks with me on the phone [...] He's also applying for the same courses as me. We already told that if we get an admit in the same university, we should definitely go to that university. He suggested me many things. Actually, we are working together. [...] The first person who comes into my mind when I have a doubt is him." – Gopal

- Meetups
- Travel and accommodation

'I felt the TU Munich group was like a collective mind. I have a problem, someone solves it for me. Someone else has a problem, I solve it.'

'It was a lonely and scary road before I found the groups. And then suddenly there were 100 people always there to help me'

This case study

- Facebook and WhatsApp groups enable the activation of latent ties in a manner that has a major impact on student mobility
- Communities of practice → in order to go abroad to study, you have to first study how to go abroad

Conclusion

- Whole new migration infrastructures are being created in these social media spaces.
- Mutual support Facebook and WhatsApp groups have dramatically increased aspirant student migrants' social capital; can be seen as democratising access to study abroad, to some extent.
- Strong anti-consultant narrative
- Not just Indians, not just Germany
- Understanding student mobility from countries in the "Global South" demands attention to social media spaces
- Covid-19
