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01:11:30 Mark Johnson: I would suggest highlighting the importance of work and support for faculty and especially for students in the "service professions" (such as teaching, nursing, public health, social work, counseling, social pedagogy, special education, rehab sciences and services, etc.). for several reasons. One: vitally important but often neglected fields for post-conflict reconstruction. Two: good evidence that active participation in such work (through service learning and community-based pedagogy) can have strong psycho-social healing effects for participating students. Three: tend to be fields and professional networks that draw in disadvantaged populations and contribute directly to greater gender equity and community healing and re-integration after conflicts
