My question is, why do you continue cooperating with them during announced academic boycott?

He also mentioned that Russian students hoping to study abroad need to have the means to go abroad to even apply for a credit card. How can western universities support these students? However, many open letters and statements support the war, not only from rectors but also from students, teachers, and scientists. What actions, in your opinion, can be taken to increase the critical thinking of the academic community in Russia?

00:59:09 Vladislav Popov: Russia's leading universities are public universities. Despite operating in a market environment, they are deeply dependent on state funding. The rector of any university can easily be dismissed if he or she does not support state actions. What are the ways of expressing an independent position in the current circumstances?

01:02:02 Georgiana Mihut: Acknowledging the incertanty of the war, I am thinking about the reconciliation and reconstruction work that will need to take place in Russia after the war. Is there anything the international community should be doing in preparation for the post-war phase?
