00:53:23 philip altbach: Also—what proportion of international academics in China are of Chinese ethnicity? This is an important issue relating to other countries too.

00:53:45 Huiyuan Ye: It is interesting to learn about how those relatively more junior AH/SS academics compare with senior NS academics in facing these challenges in view of the socio-political environment in China. In our joint venture institution, there was an incident where a conference on an SS topic was shot down by authorities.

00:54:23 Ruth Hayhoe: How far are these academics communicating a more accurate and empathetic understanding of Chinese academia than tends to be projected in Western media after they return? This aspect of bridge building would be worth follow up.
