In part this is driven by the funding structures that encourage this kind of precarity. It's likely Covid-19 will deepen this divide. To what extent should 'kindness' in research actually mean active revolution against the structures which promote inequality?

01:04:55 Simon Marginson: In the literature on global research there is a tension between those who see science as primarily driven by national resources, governments and agendas, and those who argue that bottom up cooperation between networked researchers, across borders, increasingly shapes science. Obviously both are present but the issue is the balance, and where global science is going. Has the pandemic period been associated with a trend towards reassertion of national power in science, or continued the growth of global networking to a stronger role?

It is still an open question to what extent this is working for COVID19, in terms of information dissemination and quality of published research.

The funding loss and financial deficits in turn will lead to cutting-down of positions. This is particularly devastating for those on precarious contracts, as James pointed out in his question.

When putting into the global view, I think this may lead to another trend of international mobility of academic staff, from those institutions to countries/institutions where there is a lower risk of wage deduction.
